What the Grades Mean



What is my KS4 Teacher Target?

This is the minimum grade your teachers expect you to achieve by the end of Year 11. It is something to aim for, but it does not limit how high you can achieve.

What is my Year 11 Autumn Mock grade?

This is the grade you achieved in the written mock exam earlier this term.

If it shows **n/a**, it means you did not sit a written mock exam in that subject and your grade is based on other assessed work.

What does WAG mean?

WAG stands for Working At Grade. It shows **where you are currently working**, based on the most up to date evidence your teachers have.

For most subjects, **this will match your mock grade**. In some subjects, your WAG may include NEA work or assessments from Year 10.

If you did not complete a written mock exam, your WAG is your NEA work.

What is an Indicative Grade?

This is the grade your teacher believes you are most likely to achieve by the end of Year 11, based on your current effort, attitude and quality of work. **This grade is not fixed**. With stronger organisation, better attendance and increased effort, your Indicative Grade can improve.

Why does my report show attendance information?

Your results sheet includes your percentage attendance, the number of sessions you attended and any authorised or unauthorised absences.

Attendance is important because every lesson you miss means missing explanations, practice and feedback, all of which affect your progress. Students with strong attendance make better progress and are more likely to achieve or exceed their target grades.
